Based on this review, prohibiting parking on the south side of the road is not recommended. Currently, parking is permitted for maximum of three hours

Highland Creek Trail Project Donation - [Project Details](#)

A grant of \$200,000 has been received from [Trans Canada Trail](#) providing funds to assist in completing the Upper Highland Trail - Phase 1 Project. Construction is proposed to start this Fall:

Phase 1

Three bridges (and the trail segments between connecting Botany Park to Morningside Park. Installation of paving between the bridges and a rest node with seating and a view south of the Upper Highland watercourse. The area south of phase 1, will have a walkable connection to Morningside Park.

Phase 2

It is anticipated that additional funding (approximately equal to the grant, \$200,000) towards the second phase will be forthcoming to connect the trail along Ellesmere to Military Trail and Orton Park Drive. As this phase will align with the Meadoway Project there is a potential for cost sharing options as this project moves forward. The project is at 30% design where costs are estimated at approximately \$750,000 – 1,000,000 for phase 2.

Phase 3

Toronto Water is working in the area of Upper Highland south of Ellesmere Road, and south of the Phase 1 project on sewer protection and watercourse work. This will result in a change to the grading south of the third bridge. As part of this Toronto Water work trail improvements are expected, and this will make the improved connection into the road system of Morningside Park. More details [here](#).

If you wait, a problem could become worse and you may be charged for some or all of the repair work. All issues have to be submitted. Please make a point of submitting any and all maintenance or repair issues. It will assist in getting necessary work done.

If you speak to your Management Office staff, you still need to call repair issues in to the Client Care Centre at 416-981-5500 right away! Management will not do this for you. Once a

report has been filed TCHC can monitor its progress.

It also creates an excellent overview for TCHC head office staff as they can see if there is an increase in issues in certain areas. The issues can then be investigated to see if there is a larger concern which needs to be dealt with

TRCA Ground Breaking Ceremony

Toronto and Region Conservation Authority broke ground on a new 8,100 square metre administrative office building scheduled to open in summer 2021. The new building will set the standard for sustainable commercial building design and showcase appropriate development within a watershed. The four-storey office building, with a mass timber structural system, will meet a number of environmental standards including the Toronto Green Standard Tier II certification, the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Platinum certification and the WELL Silver certification. The project is also participating in the Canadian Green Building Council's Zero Carbon Building Pilot Program.

Council Highlights

Toronto City Council meeting of July 16, 17 and 18, 2019

Housing and social support

Community housing revitalization projects

Council adopted a new approvals framework to guide Toronto Community Housing Corporation revitalization projects. City staff are to report in October on how Toronto

Community Housing will ensure that revitalization projects include consultations with affected tenants and include social development plans. Council directions were also adopted for two specific revitalizations that are now in the works.

Waiting list for rent geared to income

Discussion about the City's centralized waiting list for rent-geared-to-income housing concluded with Council agreeing to ask staff to provide quarterly progress reports on the implementation of a new choice-based model for access to the City's social housing. Council also specified an October date for staff to provide a report to the Economic and Community Development Committee, including an update on service improvements made to the centralized waiting list.

Road safety and cycling infrastructure

Vision Zero 2.0 road safety plan

Council endorsed the Vision Zero 2.0 plan for road safety in Toronto. As an update to the original 2016 safety plan, Vision Zero 2.0 initiatives include a range of additional efforts to reduce the risk of serious injuries and fatalities. One focus is lowering speed limits on designated streets. Another involves a plan for automated speed enforcement, with the aim of installing 50 speed-reduction cameras in school and community zones by the end of this year.

Updated plan for cycling network

Council approved an updated Cycling Network Plan and specific infrastructure investments as work continues for making cycling safety and more convenient. The plan identifies existing, planned and proposed city-wide cycling routes as the backbone of the overall cycling network. Council's approval will result in the installation of about 15 lane kilometres of new or improved bike lanes/cycle tracks, mostly for cycling routes in parts of Etobicoke, North York and Scarborough. In addition, safety-related upgrades will be made to existing routes.

Standards, safety and security

Licensing of vehicles for hire

Council adopted amendments to the City's vehicles-for-hire bylaw to Council adopts new requirements to improve the safety and accessibility of taxicabs and limousines, and vehicles operated by private transportation companies such as Uber and Lyft. In addition to specifying a series of safety measures, the City is introducing an accessibility funding program to help offset the higher cost of providing wheelchair accessible service. The program will be funded through a regulatory charge on members of the industry who do not provide wheelchair accessible service.

Managing emergencies in apartment buildings

Council supported amending the Toronto Municipal Code to require building owners/operators to develop and maintain a vital-service-disruption plan to better serve

their residents during prolonged disruption of a building's vital services. That steps was taken in the context of a report assessing the City's emergency response to the incident at 260 Wellesley St. E. last year, and addressing emergency management interventions for highrise buildings in general.

Child care

Child-care capital projects in jeopardy

Council decided to ask the Ontario government to provide operating funding to support 51 child-care capital projects in Toronto that are at risk of not proceeding because of a recent provincial decision. Among motions adopted with this agenda item, one involves a City request to the federal government concerning its negotiation of a renewed Early Learning Childcare Agreement with the province.

Occupancy agreements with school boards

Council voted to direct the Children's Services division to identify financial resources to continue funding occupancy agreements for early-years and child-care programs with the Toronto school boards from January 1, 2020 until the City's 2020 budget approval. Bridge funding is needed for the City to avoid having to notify the four school boards of the City's intention to terminate occupancy agreements in the schools effective January 1, when currently available funding expires. Council also directed staff to reiterate a request for the province to fully fund these programs.

Planning, economy and environment

Laneway suites

Council adopted a series of recommendations for Official Plan amendments that will extend the current policy and regulatory framework for laneway suites apply across the entire city. Laneway suites, which are self-contained residential units along public laneways, can contribute to the supply of rental housing while providing more opportunities for people to live close to where they work, shop and play. They also contribute to making laneways more green, livable and safe.

Expanding housing options across Toronto

Council asked staff to consult with community associations and prepare a report on increasing housing options in areas of Toronto designated as Neighbourhoods in Toronto's Official Plan. The report is to include addressing the possibility of undertaking a "missing middle" pilot project in Ward 19 Beaches-East York. The missing middle refers to housing forms such as duplexes and low-rise apartments that are found in some neighbourhoods but not in others.

Municipal facilities and resources

Emergency procedures for City work sites

A motion concerning emergency procedures for City staff and officials was adopted by Council.

Staff, elected officials and members of the public in City Hall on July 3 experienced a sudden lock-down for security reasons tied to an incident involving a firearm outside the building. Council wants simplified instructions and annual drills to assist with lock-down and related procedures, and emergency preparedness in general, at municipal buildings.

Cyber security

Council requested the creation of standard incident management procedures, including communication protocols, to address incidents involving cyberattacks/information breaches. The City already has a cyber-security foundation in place to protect the City's information technology system, having launched its formal Cyber Security Program in 2017. Cyber-security training will now be mandatory for all City staff.

City offices at Union Station

Council adopted a report on using much of Union Station's east wing as office space as part of a strategy for reducing City office leases and associated costs. Using three east-wing floors at the municipally owned Union Station will enable the City to eliminate several leases for municipal office space.

On Sunday August 11th join the South Asian Autism Awareness Centre in its annual fund-raising walk! Every child needs and deserves the chance to prove to the world they are capable; that they too can contribute to their communities and can lead rich and meaningful lives.

This year, the Centre is looking to attract **500+** attendees and raise **\$250,000+** to help our children and youth access vital ASD therapies.

ASD treatment can be very expensive for parents. In Ontario, intensive ABA (Applied Behaviour Analysis) **therapy can cost up to \$80,000 a year**. In addition, the Ontario Association of Speech-Language Pathologists and Audiologists has a recommended rate of **\$190 per hour** for Speech-Language Therapy.

For many of our families, these costs are just too much. With your support, the SAAAC Autism Centre can subsidize the costs of these programs, making it more affordable and accessible to families in need of urgent support.

Access Counts — 2019 Autism Conference: Best Practices to Empower Diverse Communities is a two-day conference that will bring together an extraordinary contingent of professionals working in the fields of autism and related neurodevelopmental disorders to discuss research-informed and evidence-based practices that can alter the landscape of interventions for under-resourced communities across Canada.

Day 1 of Access Counts will be led by Keynote Speaker, Dr. Vikram Patel - a pioneer in

utilizing community resources for the prevention and treatment of mental health disorders in low resource countries. Dr. Patel is currently The Pershing Square Professor of Global Health in the Department of Global Health and Social Medicine at Harvard Medical School. Dr. Patel's talk will focus on how we can work collectively to increase access to critical mental health and developmental health services for communities who are commonly undeserved. Dr. Patel's keynote will be followed by featured speakers and concurrent sessions that focus on clinical research and interventions, and community-based practices for children, youth, and families living with autism.

Day 2 of Access Counts will focus on sharing promising practices in designing and delivering adult supports in inclusive communities through employment, housing, social enterprise, self-advocacy, and transition planning. The day's presentations will be led by a host of sector experts who will share their successes and on-going challenges in accessing necessary resources for adults living in diverse communities who are pursuing independent and supported housing, employment, and post-secondary education.

Mayor John Tory and Barbara Byers, Public Education Director for the Lifesaving Society, are sharing information on how Swim to Survive programs help ensure water safety in Toronto.

Swim to Survive teaches the essential skills needed to survive an unexpected fall into deep water -- an important first step to being safe around water. The City of Toronto, in partnership with the lifesaving society and school boards, funds and delivers Swim to Survive programming to more than 15,000 grade-four students each year. City Council takes action to improve the safety and accessibility of vehicles-for-hire

Toronto City Council adopted a number of amendments to the Vehicles-for-Hire By-law to improve the safety and accessibility of taxicabs, limousines and private transportation companies (PTCs) such as Uber and Lyft.

The new requirements:

Public Safety:

- Increase the current minimum years of driving experience from one year to three years.
- Make it mandatory for all drivers to take a third-party training program approved by the City. Preliminary topics include: transporting passengers in a safe manner; driving in an urban setting; providing accessible service; anti-racism, diversity and sensitivity; and legal requirements.
- Require all drivers to affix "Watch for Bike" notices to their vehicles. PTCs will also be required to push notifications to passengers that instruct them to look for cyclists before exiting a vehicle.
- Mandate drivers to securely mount all handheld devices to their vehicle.
- Require drivers to display notices if a camera is being used to record passengers.

Accessibility:

- Introduce an Accessibility Fund Program to help offset the higher cost of providing wheelchair accessible service. The program will be funded through a regulatory charge on members of the industry that do not provide wheelchair accessible service. Funds will be dispersed based on service standards, such as the amount of hours an accessible vehicle is available for dispatch.
